

through, is reflected in the observation of Passover in every way; **I Corinthians 5:7**. Easter on the other hand is adopted from the pagan celebration of the fertility goddess Ishtar/Asherah who was worshipped through temple prostitution and child sacrifice.

So the better question is, why does the church excuse and encourage the celebration of this perverted, murderous, pagan festival as if it has somehow faithfully represented the death and resurrection of Yeshua; while on the other hand condemn as legalism, the pure celebration of Passover and first fruits commanded by God which faithfully represents, in every way, Yeshua's death and resurrection? **Yehochanan (John) 1:29; V'yikra (Leviticus) 23:4-14; I Corinthians 5:7,8; 15:20**.

The Messiah Yeshua condemned the religious leaders of the day for treating as commandments the traditions of men, and for nullifying God's commandments through their traditions; **Mattit'yahu (Matthew) 15:6-9**. His message to the religious leaders of today is the same.

As Yeshua said to the Samaritan woman (the equivalent of a gentile in Yeshua's day), "You know not what you worship, but we know who we worship, for salvation is of the Jews.

And the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and in truth, for the Father is seeking such to worship Him. God is spirit, and those who worship Him, **MUST** worship Him in spirit and in truth; **Yehochanan (John) 5:22-24**.

If the church were to take the practice of prostitution and of aborting unborn children and turn it into a holiday commemorating the death and burial of Yeshua, would you celebrate it as a legitimate biblical celebration? The bottom line is if you celebrate Easter, then you have already legitimized, in Messiah's name, the murder of all the children who were sacrificed to the cursed deity Ishtar and of all the repulsive acts of prostitution committed in her temples.

And as it is written in **I Corinthians 10:20,21**:

10:20 "the things which the Gentiles sacrifice, they sacrifice to demons, and not to God, and I do not want you to have fellowship with demons.

10:21 You cannot drink the cup of Yeshua and the cup of demons. You cannot eat at Yeshua's table and at the table of demons."

And in **I Corinthians 6:15,16**:

6:15 "Do you not know that your bodies are members of the body of Messiah? Shall I then take the members of the body of Messiah and make them members of a prostitute? God forbid!

6:16 Do you not know that he who is joined to a prostitute is one body with her? For *'the two,'* He says, *'shall become one flesh'.*"

And again, in **2 Corinthians 6:14-18**:

6:14 "...what fellowship does righteousness have with Torahlessness? And what communion does light have with darkness?

6:15 What agreement can be made between the Messiah and wickedness? Or what part does a believer have with an unbeliever?

6:16 And what agreement has the Temple of God with idols? For you are the Temple of the living God. As God has said, 'I will dwell in them and walk among them. I will be their God and they shall be My people.

6:17 Therefore, come out from among them and be separate says Yehovah.

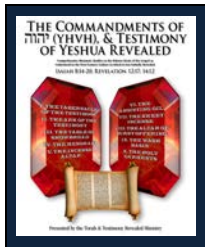
Do not touch what is unclean, and I will receive you.

6:18 I will be a Father to you, and you shall be My sons and daughters, says Yehovah Almighty.”

So do you desire to serve Him in purity and in truth, or in impurity and with compromise? ...Desire to be a good catholic/protestant Christian faith-ful to the doctrines of men and of the Pope, or to be a faithful follower of Yeshua, and faithful to the commandments of God, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob?
